

## A Dedication to Ashley Krestianson

In 1994 beautiful eight-year old Ashley Krestianson lost her way and, tragically, her life. While wandering with her twin sister Lindsay, Ashley took a shortcut and never returned home.

The massive search for Ashley spawned the development of several community-based search and rescue organizations – all with one goal – to help the RCMP find missing persons. The RCMP realized they needed to train these volunteers to help with searches, and met with representatives from those fledgling community-based search and rescue organizations. From those initial meetings, Search and Rescue Saskatchewan Association of Volunteers (SARSAV) came into existence as the umbrella organization for member-chapters and individual search and rescue volunteers in the province. Under the direction of the RCMP, search and rescue volunteers received training, which has grown and evolved over the decades into national standards for search and rescue professionals, paid and unpaid, across the country.

### **About Us**

Search and Rescue Regina Inc. is a member-chapter of Search and Rescue Saskatchewan Association of Volunteers (SARSAV).

#### **Mission**

To support the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, Regina Police Service, or designated authority in their efforts to locate missing persons or assist in other related emergencies.

#### Vision

Search and Rescue Regina will transform into a leading search and rescue organization in the service of our community.

#### What we do

Our trained ground search and rescue volunteer members help others in need in our community by giving their time to train, be activated on missing person missions, and provide safety information to the community. We are on call 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year.

#### How we do it

Police agencies request SARAV's professional SAR volunteers through the Provincial Emergency Communications Center by a text message. The Professional SAR Responders from SARSAV chapters closest to the search are then deployed to the search area. SARSAV assigns a Search Manager to work in unified command with Municipal Police and RCMP. Saskatchewan Public Safety Agency is also deployed to many searches. SPSA, RCMP, Municipal Police and SARSAV work closely together on Ground SAR missions in Saskatchewan.

We implemented best-practice training in partnership with other search and rescue chapter members. ### Recruit, Retain, Equip and Train Members

To support the missing and their families, it's essential that our members make a firm and long-term commitment to continuously train to improve their skills. During 2024, SAR Regina revised our recruitment process. Potential recruits must now attend a recruitment information session and field training prior to being accepted into Ground Search and Rescue (GSAR) training, which is a prerequisite to be able to be activated on searches. This new process makes our time and financial commitments very clear, which will ensure that we attract and retain highly committed members who actively participate in training and search activations.

### Recruit, Retain, Equip and Train Members

#### Search and Rescue Saskatchewan Association of Volunteers

SARSAV works with stakeholders to establish memorandums of understanding, service contracts and provincial training standards for all professional SAR volunteers.

Last year, SARSAV supported SAR Regina by providing instructors for two Ground Search and Rescue (GSAR) 40-hour training sessions and Disaster Assistance Response Training in Regina.

SARSAV also hosted a Multi-Jurisdictional Search Exercise at Fowler Lake. August 2 to 4th SARSAV teams from across Saskatchewan met for a weekend of training, presentations, guest speakers, and exercises that included Onion Lake First Nation, Civil Air Search and Rescue Association (CASARA), Royal Canadian Mounted Police, Saskatchewan Public Safety Agency and Animal Protection Services of Saskatchewan.

In response to the May 17, 2024, amendments to the occupational health and safety provisions of The Saskatchewan Employment Act that came into force requiring all provincially-regulated Saskatchewan workplaces to have a violence policy and prevention plan in place, SARSAV introduced new policies, procedures, and mandatory training. SAR Regina members completed the Enough Already online course.

# Support Member Accessibility and Organizational Financial Sustainability

As a provincially registered Non-Profit Corporation, SAR Regina receives no government funding. We raise what we need, and use those funds to purchase equipment and provide our members with training opportunities. Over the years our members have volunteered at fundraising events, sold lottery tickets, and sold items. 2024 was pivotal for SAR Regina as we explored new revenue streams.

Applied for charitable registration through the Government of Canada. Awaiting approval.

Secured funds from Andy Crooks, André Piasta, Cabela's, Cache Tactical, Esri Canada, SaskEnergy, SaskTel Pioneers, Canadian Pacific Kansas City (CPKC), and the RCMP General Mess.

Generated funds by selling Tickcoins, emergency whistles, seeds, ice melter, and shirts.

### Modernize Equipment and Leverage New Technologies

SAR involves two aspects – search and rescue – both needing different equipment and skills. It's essential that every professional SAR volunteer be proficient in the use equipment to navigate and communicate with other team members during training and activations. Then once an individual is found, professional SAR volunteers must be able to provide prolonged first aid and safely extract the subject. By purchasing and training on the equipment, when the call comes to activate, our members are prepared.

Prepared a comprehensive equipment needs assessment.

Produced new Member and Director Handbooks

#### Acquired Equipment:

- Telescoping mast antenna
- GPS units, radios, walkie-talkies in sturdy transport cases
- Marshalling wands, LED road flares/emergency beacons
- Supplemental first aid kit items including CTOMS Heat Loss Prevention Kit (HeLP) (hypothermia kit), combat tourniquet, modular bandages, triage tags, and more.
- Litter basket and Automated external defibrillator (AED)
- Personal Protection Equipment for a specific evidence search activation

## Accountability

SAR Regina operates in Saskatchewan under *The Non-profit*Corporations Act and is governed by the SARR Constitution and
Bylaws, which identify the organization's name, purpose, membership composition, fees and meetings, duties of officers and wind-up procedures. These documents are publicly available on our website.

According to the Constitution:

The Corporation shall be a Non-Profit Membership Corporation as defined by *The Non-Profit Corporation Act* of the Province of Saskatchewan.

The objectives of Search and Rescue Regina Inc. shall be as follows:

- To support the search and rescue efforts of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP), Regina Police Service (RPS) or other agencies by providing personnel who are trained and capable of properly performing SAR or other requested duties.
- To respond to any incident or accident which involves one or more people deemed to be lost, not arrived at destination or not seen during a period of time as to be deemed an emergency with local authorities.
- To be organized and developed as necessary to provide a service during or after an emergency.
- To cooperate with other SAR agencies to provide improved levels of SAR service when it is within the capability of the rescue team to undertake the mission safely.

• To support law enforcement and/or other emergency services agencies in activities sanctioned by the Board of Directors.

The SAR Regina organization and its members serve and are accountable to a number of community stakeholders including:

- The Missing and Families of The Missing
- Agencies Having Jurisdiction on every activation
- Search and Rescue Volunteer Association of Canada and Search and Rescue Saskatchewan Association of Volunteers
- Other first responders and health professionals
- Our greater community

#### Leadership

- SAR Regina is a small volunteer-run organization and thus has an operational Board of Directors. We are ground searchers. We are administrators.
- The volunteer Board of Directors and no member of the Board receives compensation to perform their Board duties.
- In addition to demonstrating a base of compassion for The Missing, the Board of Directors actively recruits to bring a wide range of specific competencies and professional expertise to the organization.
- They are elected to the Board at the Annual General Meeting.
